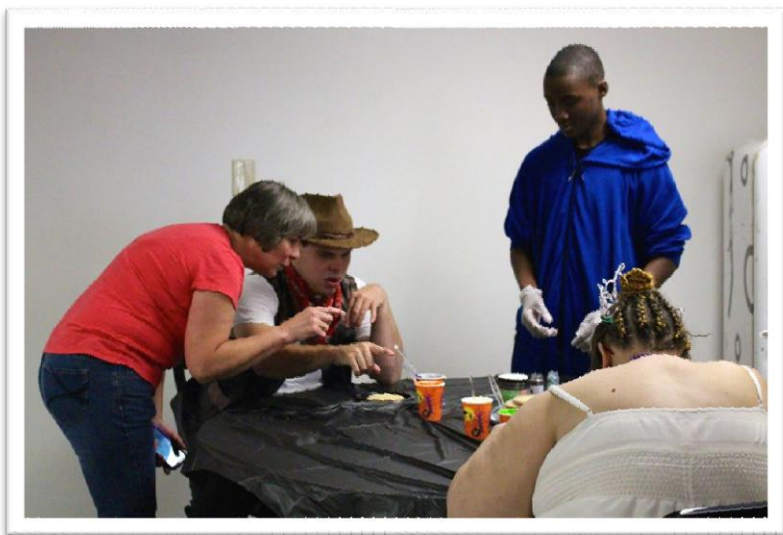

Inputs to Support our Cohorts:

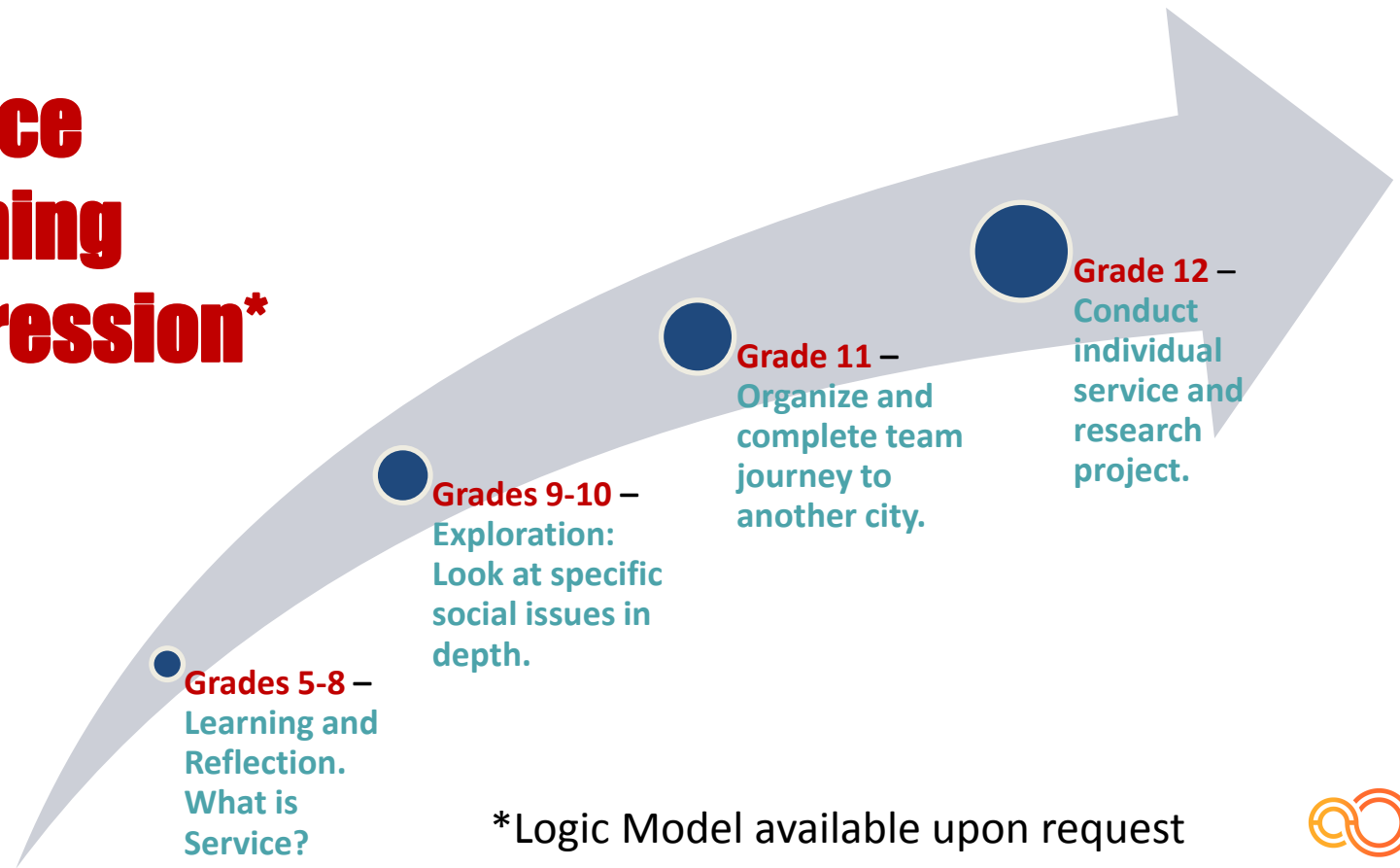

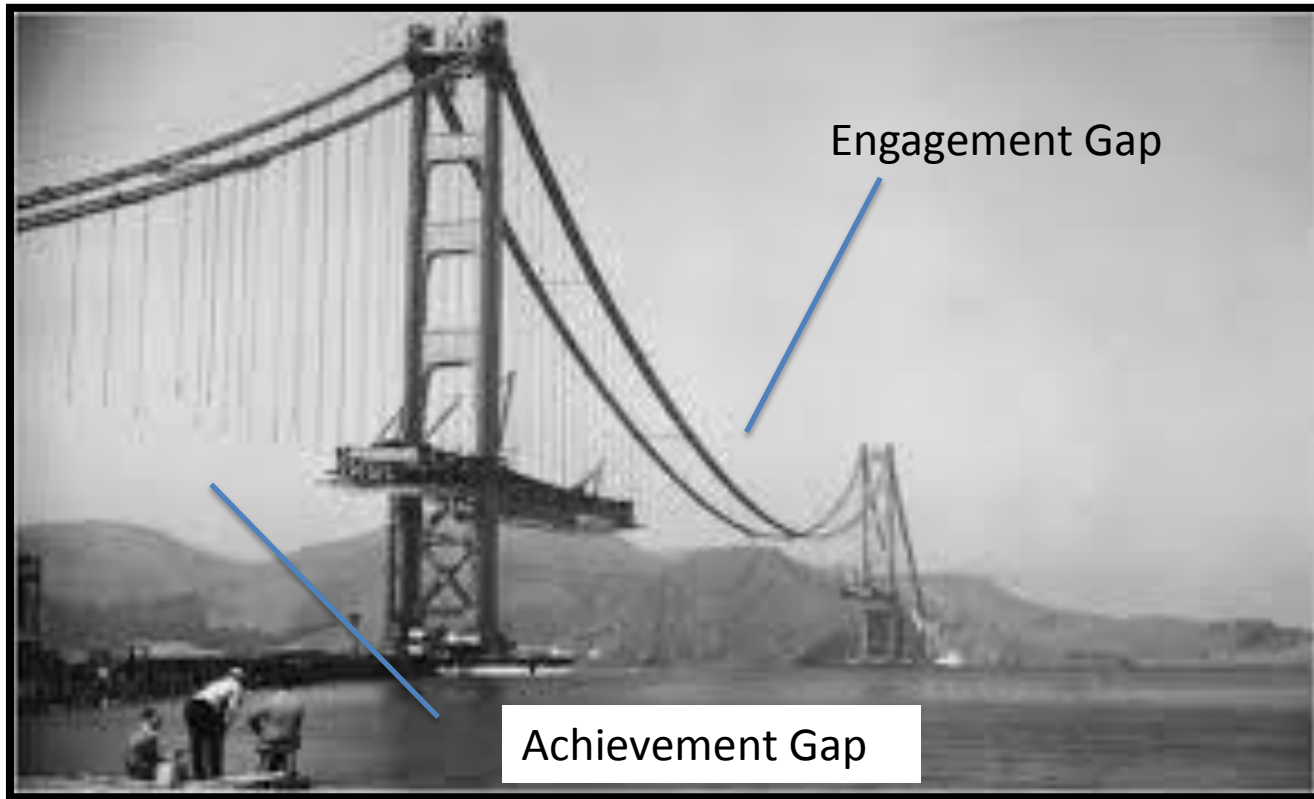

Framework to Create a SL Project

Process

PBL

1. Identify the Problem
2. Success Criteria
3. Possible Solutions
4. Pick a Solution
5. Test, Revise, Repeat, Presentation
6. Reflection
